


Macintosh IIfx Special Options and Technical Information



Radio and television interference

The equipment described in this manual generates and uses radiofrequency energy. If it is not installed and used properly—that is, in strict accordance with Apple's instructions—it may cause interference with radio and television reception.

This equipment has been tested and complies with the limits for a Class B computing device in accordance with the specifications in Subpart J of Part 15 of FCC rules. These specifications are designed to provide reasonable protection against such interference in a residential installation. However, there is no guarantee that the interference will not occur in a particular installation.

You can determine whether your computer is causing interference by turning it off. If the interference stops, it was probably caused by the computer or one of the peripheral devices.

If your computer system does cause interference to radio or television reception, try to correct the interference by using one or more of the following measures:

- Turn the television or radio antenna until the interference stops.
- Move the computer to one side or the other of the television or radio.
- Move the computer farther away from the television or radio.
- Plug the computer into an outlet that is on a different circuit from the television or radio. (That is, make certain the computer and the television or radio are on circuits controlled by different circuit breakers or fuses.)
- Consider installing a rooftop television antenna with a coaxial cable lead-in between the antenna and the television.

If necessary, consult your authorized Apple dealer or an experienced radio/television technician for additional suggestions.

You may find helpful the following booklet, prepared by the Federal Communications Commission: "How to Identify and Resolve Radio-TV Interference Problems" (stock number 004-000-00345-4). This booklet is available from the U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, DC 20402.

Δ Important: This product was tested for FCC compliance under conditions that included the use of shielded cables and connectors between system components. It is important that you use shielded cables and connectors to reduce the possibility of causing interference to radios, television sets, and other electronic devices. For Apple peripheral devices, you can obtain the proper shielded cables from your authorized Apple dealer. For non-Apple peripheral devices, contact the manufacturer or dealer for assistance. Δ

Special Options and Technical Information

Your MacintoshTM IIfx is designed to provide maximum performance and expandability. In addition to offering the ease of use and consistency common to all Macintosh computers, the Macintosh IIfx incorporates a variety of custom-designed components that delivers a strikingly increased operation speed.

Advanced features

The Macintosh IIfx offers the highest performance and greatest expandability of any Macintosh. Its advanced features are summarized in this section.

Performance

These features provide state-of-the-art performance in your Macintosh IIfx:

- the Motorola® 68030 microprocessor, running at 40 megahertz (MHz)
- the Motorola 68882 floating-point coprocessor, running at 40 MHz
- a built-in memory cache of 32 kilobytes (K) of static RAM
- seven specially designed application-specific integrated circuits (ASICs) that maximize speed and control of internal processing, memory management, and flow of data to and from peripheral devices
- a minimum of 4 megabytes (MB) of dynamic RAM as main memory
- a quiet, variable-speed cooling fan that increases speed when additional cards are installed in the computer
- optional parity error checking, through a special configuration of memory installed when the computer is manufactured

Expandability

The expansion capabilities of the Macintosh IIfx include

- a choice of several monochrome and color monitors, including a full-page-display monitor and a two-pagedisplay monitor
- six NuBusTM expansion slots, for expansion cards such as the EtherTalkTM and TokenTalkTM cards for connection to specialized networks
- the processor-direct slot, for expansion cards that provide very high levels of performance
- capacity for an internal hard disk drive (80 or 160 MB) and two internal SuperDriveTM floppy disk drives (1.4 MB disk capacity) capable of reading MS-DOSTM disks

Special software considerations

Before you begin using your Macintosh IIfx, it's a good idea to be familiar with the information in this section.

Software operation

The advanced features of the Macintosh IIfx may require that some application programs be modified to perform properly on the computer. The programs most likely to be affected are copy-protected programs that use floppy disk—based copy-protection schemes.

If you experience a problem with a program on your Macintosh IIfx, contact your authorized Apple™ dealer or the program supplier to determine whether you need an upgraded version of the program for use with your computer. Apple has provided technical assistance to software developers so that they can modify their programs, if necessary, for use with the Macintosh IIfx.

System software installation

You can use the Macintosh system software and the $A/UX^{\scriptscriptstyle\mathsf{TM}}$ operating system with your computer, and you can also install the resources needed for networking and communication products that use the AppleTalk^{TM} network system.

The summaries that follow should help you locate the specific information you need to prepare the software for your Macintosh IIfx.

Macintosh system software

Version 6.0.5 of the Macintosh system software is supplied with your Macintosh IIfx. It consists of a *System Tools* disk, a *Printing Tools* disk, and two *Utilities* disks.

If your computer has an Apple internal hard disk, the Macintosh system software may already have been installed. (You can verify this by turning on the computer; you'll see the "happy Macintosh" icon, then the desktop will appear on the screen, with icons for the hard disk and the Trash.)

If you need to install the system software, use the instructions in Chapter 2 of the *Macintosh Reference*. This chapter provides several installation options.

AppleShare and networking software

The *Network Products Installer* disk is provided with your Macintosh IIfx. Consult the booklet *Installing Apple Network Products* (provided with the disk) for instructions on installing network products.

A/UX

If you plan to use A/UX with your Macintosh IIfx, follow the instructions in the A/UX Installation Guide to initialize or partition the hard disk in your computer or to install the Macintosh system software.

Special options

Four options help you customize the Macintosh IIfx. They are

- a processor-direct slot
- six NuBus expansion slots
- a programmer's switch (that you install if you choose to use it)
- parity error checking (installed when the computer is manufactured)

Processor-direct slot

The processor-direct slot lets you install high-performance cards that benefit from direct access to the microprocessor.

Cards that use this slot are available only from independent suppliers.

Installing a card in the processor-direct slot




Figure 1 The processor-direct slot and NuBus slots in the Macintosh IIfx

The processor-direct slot is located directly in front of the far-right NuBus expansion slot. Figure 1 shows the processor-direct slot and the six NuBus expansion slots inside the Macintosh IIfx.

▲ Warning: Be certain that any card you install in the processor-direct slot is designed for use with the Macintosh IIfx. Installing a card that is not designed for the Macintosh IIfx could damage the card, the computer, or both.

If you install a card in the processor-direct slot, you cannot use the NuBus slot directly behind the processor-direct slot.

To install a card in the processor-direct slot, follow the procedure described in the documentation for that card. Take care, however, to insert the card in the processor-direct slot; do not try to place it in a NuBus expansion slot. (See Figure 1.)

NuBus expansion slots

The six NuBus expansion slots are designed for a variety of expansion cards. One of these slots is used for the video card to which the monitor of your Macintosh IIfx is connected.

Figure 1 shows the location of the NuBus slots. Use the documentation supplied with the card you plan to install, or follow the instructions in *Setting Up Your Macintosh IIfx* or in Chapter 9 of the *Macintosh Reference* to install a card in one of these slots.

△ Important: If you have installed a card in the processor-direct slot, you cannot use the far-right NuBus slot (immediately behind the processor-direct slot). △

Programmer's switch

The programmer's switch is intended for use by programmers. If you aren't developing application programs with the Macintosh IIfx, don't install the switch. Installing it and using it in the wrong way could cause you to lose information.

If you are a program developer, install the programmer's switch only if you're developing stand-alone applications or desk accessories.

The switch has two parts. The front part of the switch is a reset switch. Pressing it is just like turning the power switch off and back on, and carries the same cautions—press it only when using the FinderTM (that is, when you're working on the desktop) with all disks properly ejected.

The back part of the switch is an interrupt switch; press it only if you have debugging software installed.




Figure 2 The programmer's switch installed in the Macintosh IIfx

The switch snaps into place on the right side of the Macintosh IIfx. Figure 2 shows the programmer's switch in place.

Installing the programmer's switch

Follow these steps to install the switch:

- 1. Align the switch so that the rightmost upper pin on the switch fits in the last air vent on the right side of the computer (as the computer is facing you).
- 2. Tip the switch and insert the top pair of pins with the hooks facing up.
- 3. Push up and in on the bottom of the switch. The switch should snap into place.

Parity error checking

Parity error checking is an option that must be specified when you order the Macintosh IIfx. Contact your authorized Apple dealer or representative to learn more about obtaining this feature.

Contents of system software disks

The contents of the four system software disks supplied with your Macintosh IIfx are listed in the table that follows. Some files are included on more than one disk.

For complete instructions for installing the system software, see Chapter 2 of the *Macintosh Reference*.




